Planning

Casualty centered plan based on sound welfare principles and safe system of work

Information gathering;

- Site Specific Risk Information
- Specialist advice
- Local knowledge
- On site information and expertise
- Interagency tactical advisors
- Resource Availability
- Other agency capabilities
- Local Response Protocols / Differences
- Over the border MOU's and variances.

Consider;

- Scene management and situational awareness
- Joint understanding of risks
- Viability assessment (euthanasia options)
- Physical capture, control, containment options
- Chemical capture and control
- Plan and control the release or final destination






In addition to standard PPE, consider additional PPE and equipment for;

- Task
- Environment
- Post Incident Protocols

Consider;

- Service Specific
- Other Local Resources
- Other agency skills and attributes

Consider whether the PPE worn is sufficient for the task, animal and environmental hazards.




Justification




Mobilising rationale;

This is unlikely to fulfil the category of statutory duty or recognised incident type

Lead agencies are likely to be Police and RSPCA and are duly informed


RSPCA cannot confirm attendance for at least an hour and Police request FRS attendance for possible forced entry

Mobilise accordingly based on information acquired through the 10 Steps to Situational Awareness....



Outcomes

- **1. Species:** Domestic / companion / pet
- **2. Situation:** Direct animal life risk / indirect human injury risk
- **3. Environment:** In transit / loose contained / hot environmental conditions
- **4. People:** No owner / agitated public / emotional impact / social media
- **5. Task:** Rescue / Pre-vet IEC / welfare / post incident recovery / transportation
- **6. Additional Animal Risks:** Heat induced stress leading to potential aggression / Animal risk of dying



7. Plan:

No action: dog dies / risk to people / animal welfare act / social media / conflict

Plan: entry / remove dog safely / render pre-vet IEC Consider: animal risk / temporary responsibility / post incident veterinary care / transportation

8. PPE and Equipment:

Default (full) PPE / restraint / control equipment (improvised) / oxygen / safe containment

9. Skill Sets:

Initial (situational awareness)

10. Action:

Mode Offensive

Consider police for cordon / crowd management / AWA **Justification**

Welfare centered plan within capabilities of an Initial qualified crew
